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

JOSEPH IS GETTING STRONGER

American School for Children is so much more than babysitting while moms study English. Our teachers make sure each child is developing and learning - even the littlest ones.

Joseph is the baby in his family with two very loving older sisters. At home, he cried a lot, so they always held him. But this hampered his muscle development.



When Joseph came to school with his mother, his teachers quickly saw that he had a problem. Although he was almost a year old, Joseph could only sit for a short time before he fell over. He could barely stand with support - let alone walk. So throughout this last year, his teachers worked to strengthen his back muscles. They worked with his mother to know how to help him at home. Day-by-day he got stronger!

Joseph continues to get physically stronger. His brain is developing in foundational ways. He is hearing two languages. He is learning to trust people – to feel safe. He is interacting with other little friends from diverse cultures.

Joseph is only One little Boy, but he is on his way to success in Kindergarten!

ANA'S PREGNANCY

Ana is learning English. BUT, at Water for Ishmael, she has found so much more...

Ana has found a community where she belongs. She has made friends – not just her American teachers, but friends that cross language, culture, and religious barriers. She has found a place where it is safe to share her life.

Ana moved to America 9 months ago. Soon after starting to study English, she found out that she is pregnant. She was worried and scared. Far from any of her family – with very little English ability – without a clue about hospitals in America - she did not want to have a baby now!



Ana's teacher and classmates cheered and celebrated this new life when she was not ready to. They encircled her, and her teacher prayed for her in Jesus' name. Then, they began to plan together to welcome this baby.



It doesn't matter what she doesn't know or have here in America. Ana has friends who will walk this road with her.

Teachers and volunteers in Ana's life reflect the love of Jesus for her because she and her baby matter!
